A good pair of glasses will make the difference

On this trip I was using a pair of polarized glasses that gave me the option to switch lenses depending on what the sky conditions were at any given moment. I was able to choose between true color grey polarized lenses for the heavy glare and intense sun we encountered during the better part of the day to rose amber lenses for the flat, low afternoon light which helped me see into the shadows without having to lift my glasses.

This lens changing system that I was using is called Switch (www.switchvision.com). It is a revolutionary new solution to deal with the challenges of changing light conditions that fishermen deal with on every outing. You have one frame with multiple magnetic lenses that you can snap in and out very fast without losing a minute of fishing time. I know you might think that lenses held in place by magnets might dislodge easily but these don't...Switch made sure of it. They are designed to withstand the pounding that the outdoor lifestyle dishes out. As a result, the frames and lenses use powerful embedded magnets to insure lens retention even when blasting down the lake to get to that next hot spot.



Switch frames are engineered with comfort, durability, and performance in mind. They are made of tough thermoplastic nylon which makes them lightweight and comfortable for those long days on the water. Another sweet feature and a favorite of Jacob Jewell is the air flow channels in the frame that helps reduce fog build up on the inside of the lenses during the smokin' hot summers days.

In short, one lens is not enough. The Switch shatterproof, scratch resistant, water repellent, and smudge resistant lens protect your eyes and enhance your vision. Instead of having different glasses for different situations and light conditions put the Switch magnet interchangeable lens system in you gear line up the next time you go fishing...they're a must have next to your favorite pole and lifejacket.
